



# Beating Cancer

It's easier than you think.

Some of our most common (and deadliest) cancers can be prevented or detected early and cured.

**Lung Cancer** causes more deaths than any other. More than 90% of lung cancer cases are caused by tobacco. You can reduce your risk by not smoking and avoiding secondhand smoke.

When **Breast Cancer** is caught early, there's a 99% survival rate. When found early, **Cervical Cancer** also has a survival rate over 90%. So talk to your doctor about getting screened. Louisiana has one of the highest **Colorectal Cancer** death rates in the nation. This is partly due to Louisiana having a high population of two groups that get the disease more than others: Cajuns and African Americans. If you are 45 or older, it's time to get screened.
